

APPENDIX A: CHRONOLOGY OF NEW MEXICO WINDOW TYPES

pre-1846	no window glass (except Palace of Governors)
1846-1980	6 panes over 6, 6/9 double-hung windows, often wavy 6" x 8" panes
1870-1900	2 vertical/2 vertical double-hung windows
1880+	large plate glass in commercial buildings
1890-1915	1/1 double-hung windows, some expensive buildings as early as 1880
1885-1910	Queen Anne style, lozenge or colored glass / 1 double-hung window
1895-1925	(American) Colonial Revival style, 4/1, 6/1, or 8/1 double-hung window
1910-1950	steel sash industrial windows, often with hopper panes in middle, first non-wood frame windows
1910-1930	Bungalow style, wood casement windows, 4 vertical/1 double-hung window (9/1, 12/1, 20/1 double-hung window for some non-Bungalow buildings)
1928-1940	metal casement windows with vertical 6" x 12" panes
1935-1955	metal casement windows with horizontal 17" x 11" panes, after 1945 with casements flanking fixed picture window
1938-1960	2 horizontal/2 horizontal double-hung window
1950+	aluminum-sliding windows, post-1970 often anodized brown
1980+	anodized aluminum and wood double-hung windows
